We provide **Australian Native Bee Incursions** to Kindergarten and Schools. These engaging and interactive sessions provide opportunity for hands on learning about our amazing native bee species with a focus on encouraging the children to think about habitat and environmental sustainability. They are tailored to provide age appropriate information and allow time for children to guide the discussion and ask lots of questions.

-what's included-

- Discussion about native bees in Victoria
- All materials are provided for the children to make their own insect hotel to take home.
 Children are also encouraged to forage for natural materials in the garden to add to their insect hotels (eg sticks, bamboo, seedpods, etc)
- Holly brings cuttings of plants that native bees are attracted to and teaches the children how to propagate some of these for the kinder/school garden.
- Picture resources made available to educators for further investigation with children
- Session length 60-75 minutes
